Learning through Language



“Language is the roadmap of a culture. It tells you where its people came from and where they are going.” – Rita Mae Brown, an American writer

Learning of language does not exist in isolation. Students understand, use and apply language in different ways with different audience. In IB, the six transdisciplinary units give an opportunity for students to apply and showcase the language skills and proficiency.

At SNIS, language is an integral part of the curriculum. During Early primary years, students learn to read. In the upper primary years, students read to learn. Listening and Speaking, Reading, Writing and Viewing and Presenting are the strands against which students are taught and assessed. Learning of additional languages like Hindi or French including the language of the land is emphasized by IB as part of the language curriculum and is offered in our school. Being Duolingo or Multilingo helps children in multi-tasking, boosts brain power and improves memory.

Reading ignites creativity, sparks curiosity and stimulates the imagination in young children. In Kindergarten, our young readers at SNIS are engaged in learning to read through phonics. Phonics is a skill taught in early years to decode words. Through primary years, students are engaged in a read aloud sessions to develop reading skills. They are encouraged to issue books from the library every week to read at home. The benefits of reading are:

- Reading develop the brain of the young minds.

- It nourishes the love of learning in the children

- It gives self-confidence to the child that they can learn independently.

- It paves way for better writers.

Writing is important in primary years to allow children to express themselves. Writing with children provides opportunities to engage them in meaning making using multiple modes of communication. For example – visual, auditory, tactile, verbal and written. Writing in SNIS is introduced in kindergarten through writing of alphabets with phonics sound. Throughout primary years, students are introduced to different genres of writing like Narrative, Descriptive, Recount, Procedural, Explanatory and Persuasive. These are called text types. Each text type is for a different purpose. Teachers model the writing using the structure of writing for that type of writing. Later, students are encouraged to write through the writing process – Pre-writing, Drafting, Revising, Editing and Publishing. Grammar is integrated as part of the writing genre. The benefits of writing are:

- It is a form of self-expression

- Stimulates creativity

- Develops thought process

- Better communication through improved vocabulary

- Helps in critical thinking

As much as reading and writing is important, so is listening and speaking & viewing and presenting in Primary years. Oratory skills in PYP are developed through class speech on various topics and debate skills.

Thus development of language in primary years is vital for the overall development of a child as language helps in comprehending the knowledge gained and also to express their opinions and ideas confidently in front of an audience.

OLE KIRK KRISTEANSEN

Ole kirk Kristiansen, the founder of Lego was born on 7th April 1891 in Filskov, near Billund, Denmark. His mother's name was Kristine and Father's was Jens Niels. He was from a poor family but still he received high school education.



Since the age of 6 he started working as a farmhand, this is where he developed interest in carving wood. In 1911, he left Denmark to go and learn carpentry in Germany.

In 1916, he married Kristine Sorenson from Norway, he had 5 children. He bought a Woodworking and Carpentry shop in Billund from the money he had saved over the years. Throughout 1920's, he focused on restoring & developing buildings.

In the 1930's due to the Great Economic Depression in Denmark, his business went into losses, and he had to dismiss all his employees as his products would not sell. This is where he decided to make cheap and small wooden products. Ole founded a company on 10th of August 1932, where he would build and sell a variety of wooden toys, he thought to name it Leg Godt, in Dutch that means play well. Later in 1934 he named it LEGO, that was short form of Leg Godt.

In 1944, he again had a fire in the factory, where all the toys were getting made. After the World War 2, most of the material used for making wooden toys was not easily available, plastic toys started became popular as they were cheap. After a few years he got his factory remade for making plastic toys.

His son Godtfred helped him expand the company and thought of making Plastic bricks that can stick to each other so the children can build with the bricks and use their imagination, instead of readymade toys. In 1947, they bought a plastic molding machine, a first to use for making toys. In Jan 1958, the Brick design was Patented. Today Lego is the most popular toy maker in the world.

Ole died on 11th of March 1958, at the age of 66 in Billund, Denmark of a heart attack. His son, Godtfred took over the company. He continued to expand the business. He also built the LEGO-LAND theme park in future.

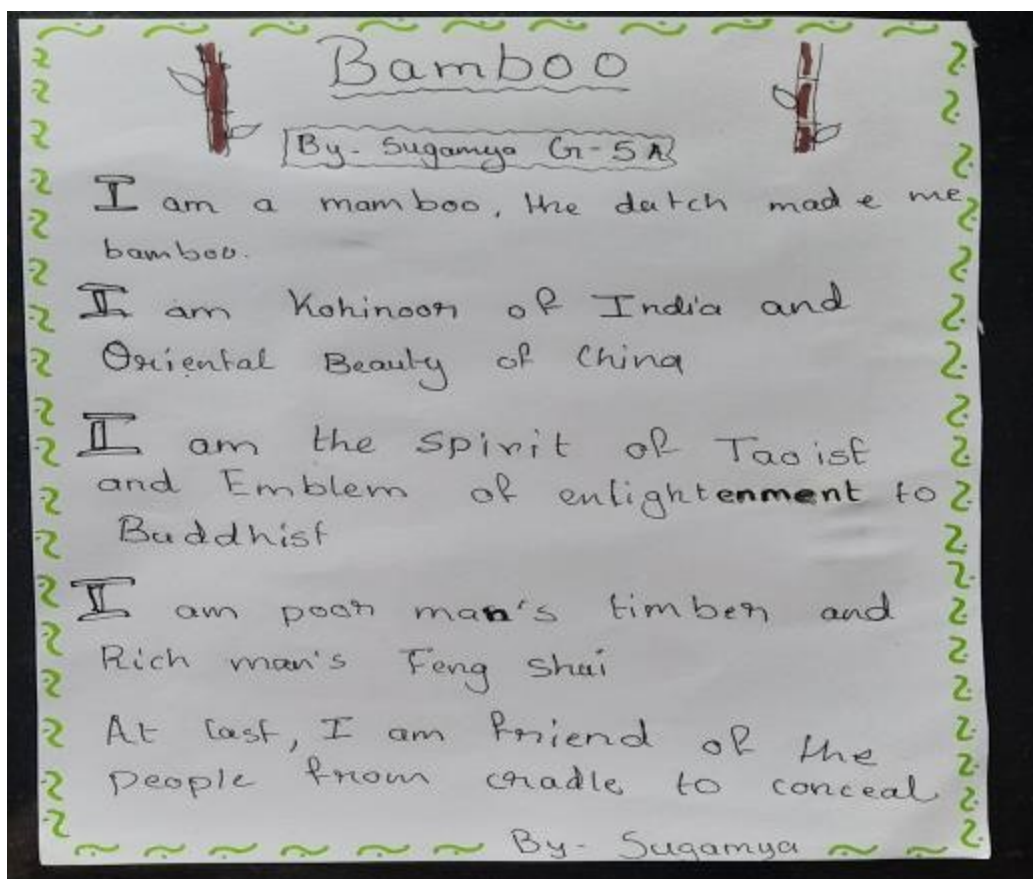

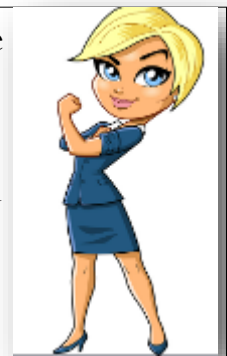

Malala Yousafzai

Malala Yousafzai was born 12 July 1997, she is the daughter of Ziauddin and Toor Pekai Yousafzai. At a very young age she had the eagerness towards knowledge.



In 2007, when she was 10 years old situations changed in her family and community. The Taliban took over the Swat Valley, they restricted girl's attending school, cultural activities were also stopped. Because of this suicide widespread that area. By the end of 2008, Taliban's destroyed over 400 schools.

Strong minded Malala had a firm belief in her right to her education, Malala with her father stood against the Taliban. "How dare the Taliban take away my basic right to education?" she once said on Pakistani TV. She became world wide known for her courage, bravery and progressive thinking. She started a blog anonymously in a Urdu webpage where she names herself 'Gul Makai' and talked about the Taliban's torture in Swat Valley. Malala continued to campaign for the right education. Her voice grew louder and louder.

Malala and her father were known throughout Pakistan for their aim to give girls the proper education. But one fine day when Malala was in the bus with her friends, two Taliban activists stopped the bus and shot Malala's head. She was seriously wounded and quickly airlifted to Pakistan military hospital. After 3-4 days she was shifted to the UK. After multiple surgeries and treatment she was finally recovered.

Malala on her 16th Birthday visited New York City and spoke in States about the Taliban and the right for education, after that she did go to many other countries and gave her speech on the right for girls to have proper education.

In October 2014 she won the Nobel prize. To provide girls around the world with equal educational opportunities, she co-founded the Malala Fund charity in 2013. In 2015, NASA named the asteroid 316201 Malala after her.

"Education is education. We should learn everything and then choose which path to follow. Education is neither Eastern nor Western, it is human." - Malala

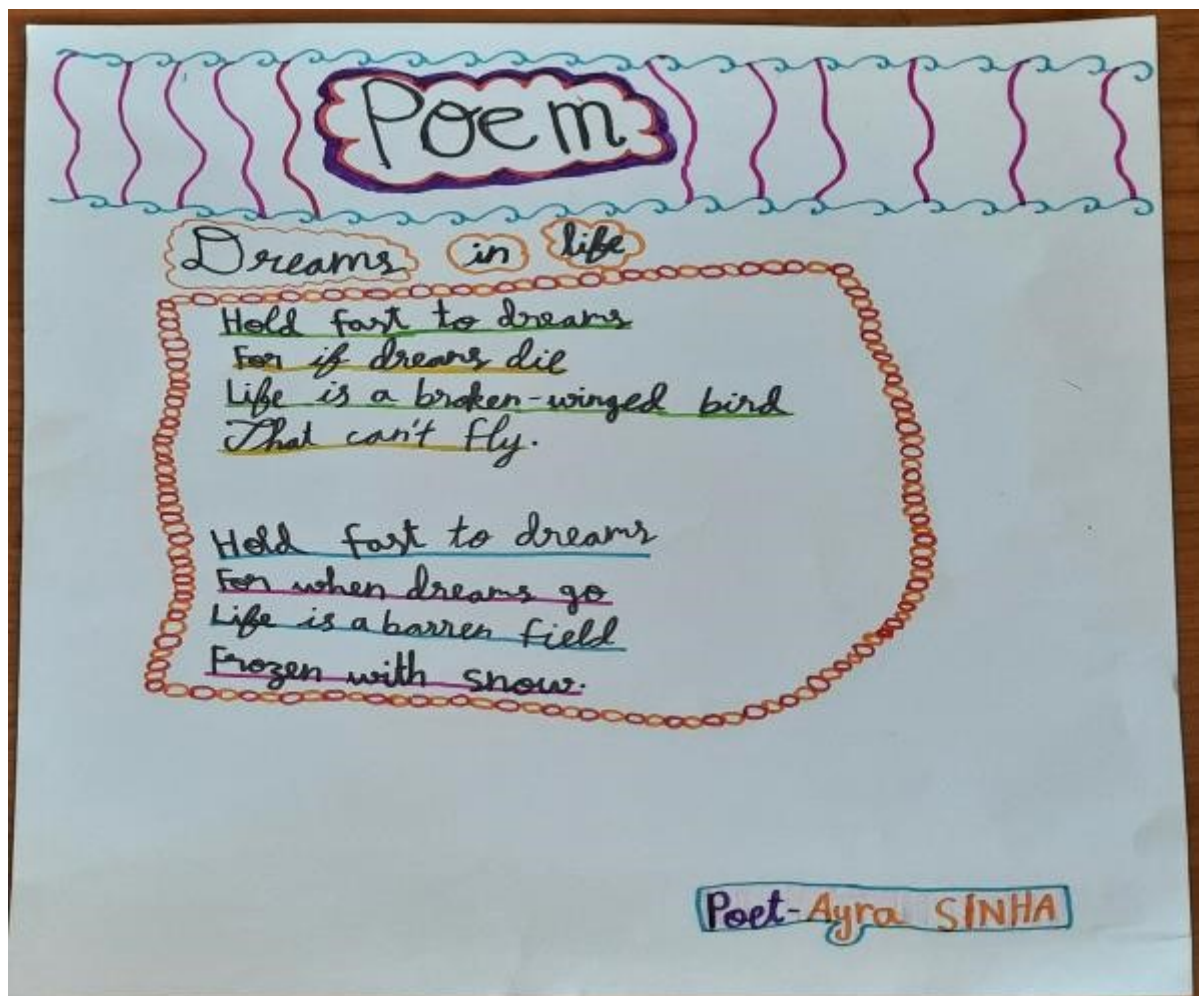

Shakuntala Devi was an Indian mental calculation and writer, popularly known as the "Human Calculator". Her talent earned her a place in the 1972 edition of the Guinness book of world records.

Devi travelled to several countries around the world demonstrating her amazing talents. She was on a tour of Europe through 1950 and was in New York City in 1976.

In 1988 she travelled to US to have her abilities tested by Arthur Jensen, a professor of educational psychology at the University of California, Berkeley. Jensen tested her performance in several tasks, including calculating the cube root of 614,125.

Devi strived to simplify numerical calculations for students. She wrote a number of books in her later years, including novels as well as texts about mathematics, puzzles and astrology. She also wrote the book "Wonders of Numbers".

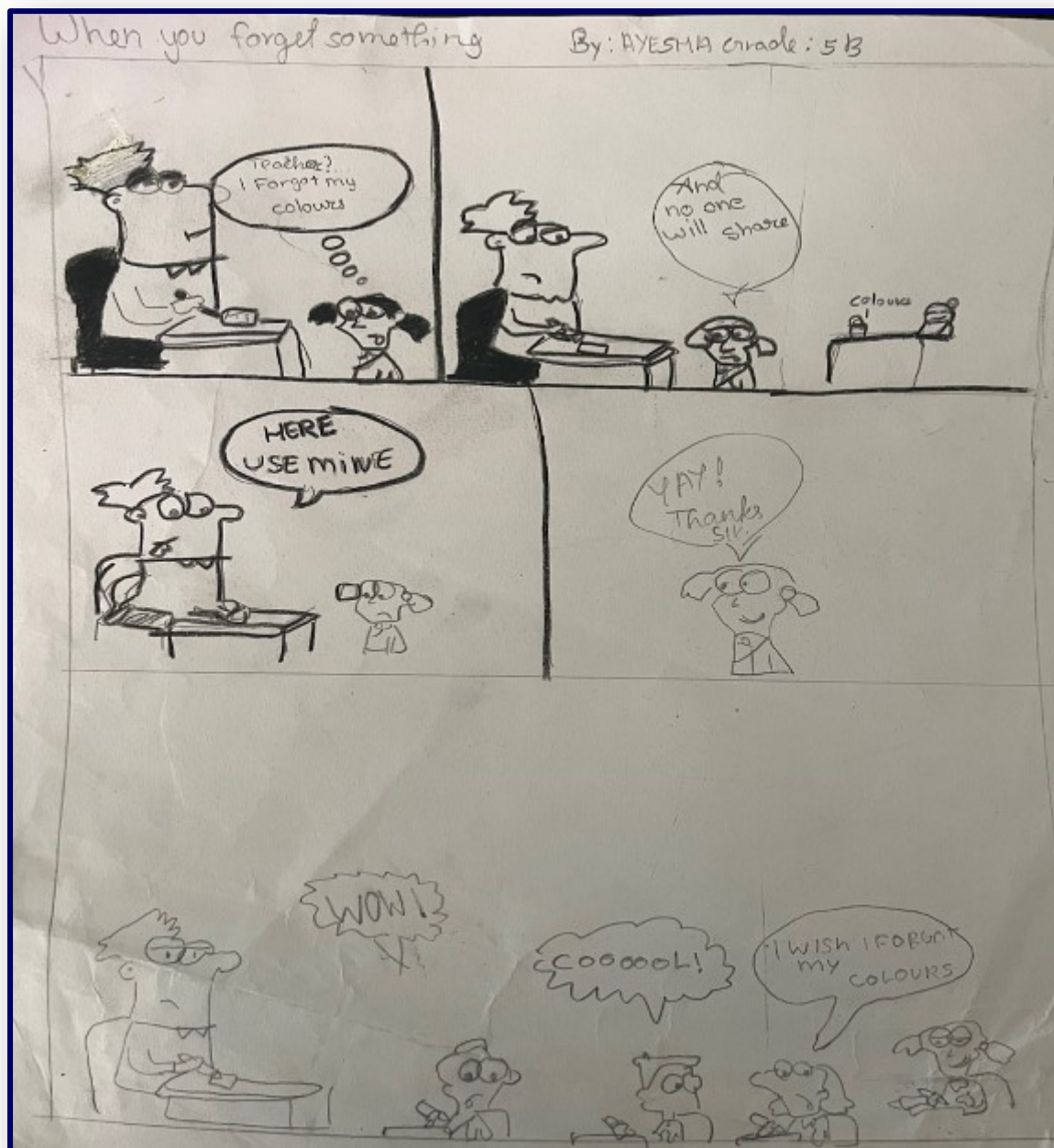

In the late 19th century Italian immigrants took pizza with them to Spain, France, England and the United States and slowly it became one of the most popular dishes around the world. 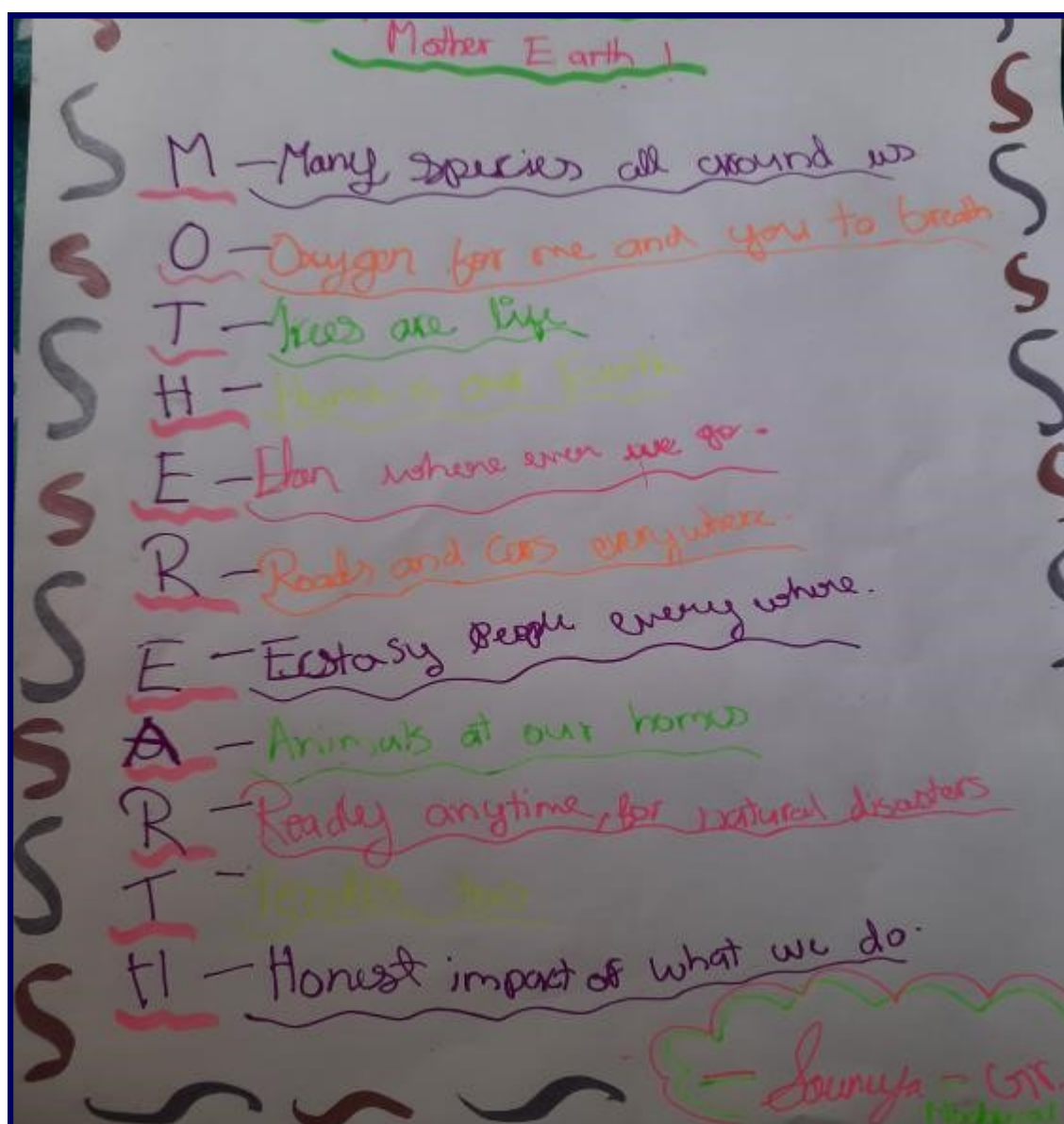

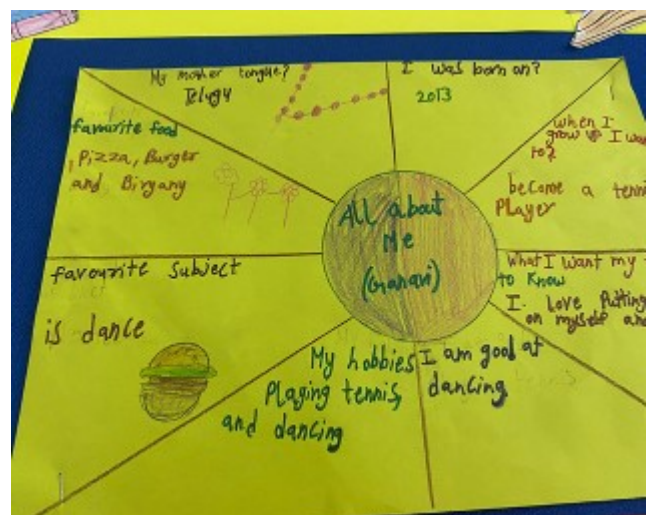
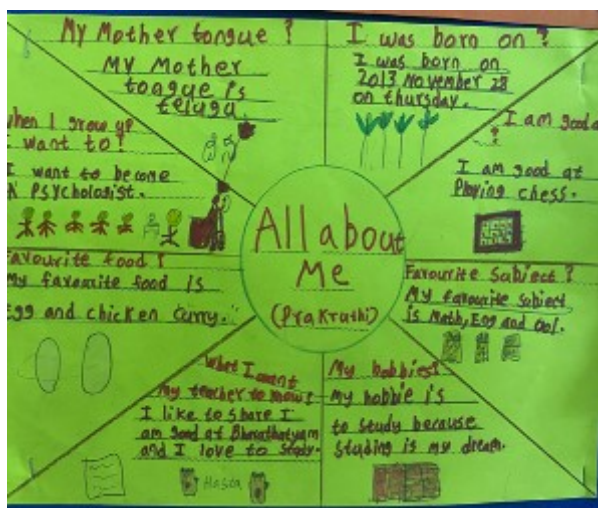

Dear prime minister,



Under the bed...

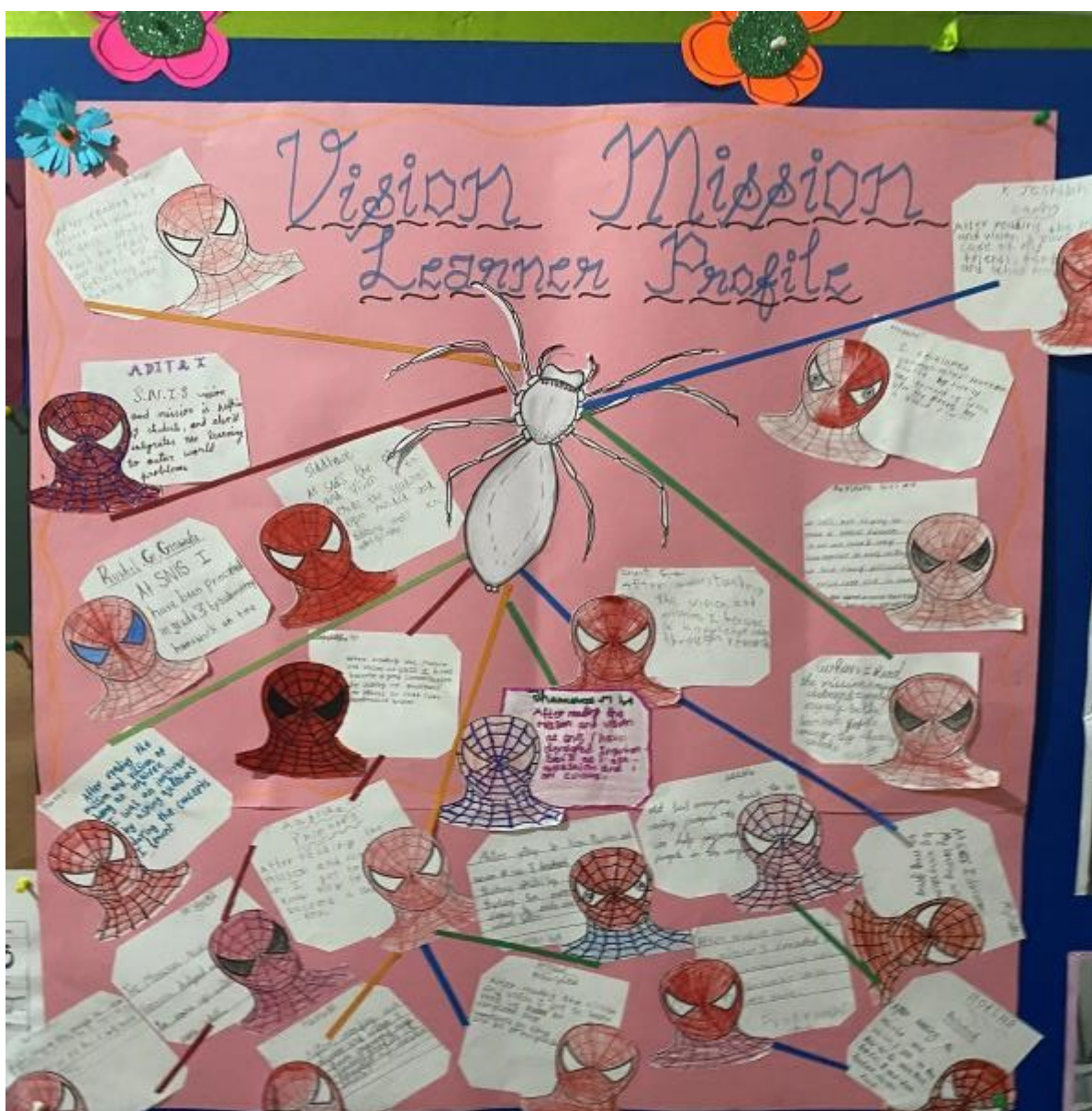

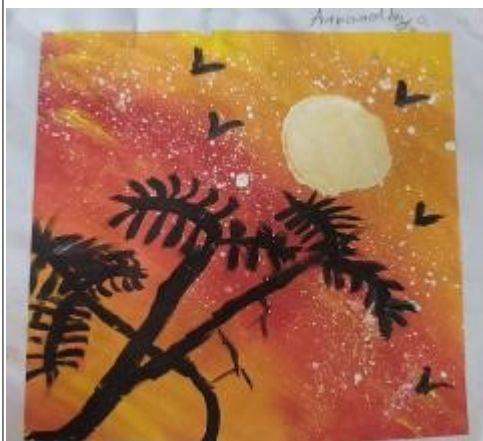
